# **New Suspended Train in Children's** Area completes "Train Depot" theme

Stop by the library's children's department and enjoy a "train depot" theme enhanced with a newly installed suspended train compliments of Quality Lime Co. The train depot theme began with the inspiration of one of Marshall's very own train stations called the Vandalia Station. Gaslight Art Colony owner and artist Jo Rich-Vadas drafted a blueprint of a child-sized depot replica and local craftsman Randy McGinnis constructed it. The construction of the bridge and track were done by Train Installations, Inc. from Atlanta, GA who are best known for their work of installing suspended trains in Chick-fil-A restaurants across the country.
